Talk It Over

Abraham was the father of Isaac, Isaac the father of Jacob, Jacob the father of Judah and his brothers.

Matthew 1:2 (ESV)

Question 1 Jesus' lineage contained deceivers, traffickers, prostitutes, and murderers, among others. We all have interesting and complicated family trees. How does God take our family experiences and turn them into a gift, allowing us to hope against hope, both for the salvation of our families and the assurance that God can turn our trials into treasures?

Talk It Over

Before the spies went to sleep that night, Rahab went up on the roof to talk with them . . . 'I know the Lord has given you this land,' she told them . . . 'For the Lord your God is the supreme God of the heavens above and the earth below.'

Joshua 2:8–9a, 11b (NLT)

Before they left, the men told her, if she wanted to be saved, when they entered the land . . . 'When we come into the land, you must leave this scarlet rope hanging from the window through which you let us down. And all your family members—your father, mother, brothers, and all your relatives—must be here inside the house.' . . . 'I accept your terms,' she replied. And she sent them on their way, leaving the scarlet rope hanging from the window.

By faith the harlot Rahab perished not with them that believed not, when she had received the spies with peace.

Hebrews 11:31 (KJV)

Question 2 God revealed himself in a godless place to a prostitute who became the great, great grandmother of King David which demonstrated that God can take any situation and redeem it for his purposes. Talk about a situation that felt hopeless without God's presence. What does the statement, 'No situation is more hopeless than our Savior is graceful' mean to you?

Question 3 When we become discouraged because of our circumstances and the future seems bleak, Habakkuk 3:17-19a teaches us that in our deepest sorrow we can find our deepest joy in God. How is it even possible to be grateful and experience joy in the midst of our darkness? How does gratitude lead to joy?

Romans 8:32 (NLT)

Question 4 In light of God's amazing gift to us at Christmas, what are you going to give him this Christmas?
